# RGVQG General Meeting - February 2017

The meeting was called to order by Carla Mewhinney, President, at 9 am at the South High School for Health Professionals in Mercedes, Texas. The March 11 meeting will also be at this location.

**Secretary's minutes** from the January meeting were adopted as published on the Web with no additions or corrections made.

**Treasurer's Report:** Karon Jacobson reported \$6,569.39 in the checking account and more than \$50,000 in savings. She stated that the 2016 Guild taxes are filed.

**Membership:** Carla announced that members whose names were in red on the sign in sheet need to pay their dues today in order for their names to be in today's drawing for the National Quilt Show scholarship awards.

Bonnie Hall reported 273 members currently in the Guild including 3 new members. She stated that she is also the Guild Webmaster, reviewed access information and said those needing assistance with the rgvqg.com website and its navigation can call her. New members and those renewing their membership may pick up their cards at the March meeting.

**Hostess** Renee Darkis reported 180 members and 4 guests present.

**Community Service:** In 2016 Guild members donated 4,296 items and 26,886 hours with a donation value of \$194,927.50. In January 2017 members donated 529 items and 1,989 hours with a value of \$14,420.25. Rick and Carla commended members for their work.

Military Service: Deb Blackbourn announced two Sew Days: February 15 at Trophy Gardens, 800 State Highway 495, Alamo; and March 7 at Green Gate Grove, Mission. Both sessions will begin at 9 am. Lunch will be served at both locations. Bring your sewing machine and supplies. <u>Lap quilts for wheelchairs and scooters only will be made at the Trophy Gardens Sew Day.</u> The size for these lap quilts will be posted on the website.

**Florea Flores** reported that the February 6 quilting session for the Youth Education Program was attended by girls age 6 through 5<sup>th</sup> grade. They made tote bags. The next class they will make a quilt. Florea would like to have this class before summer. She needs fabric donations and members may call her for pickup or bring to the March meeting. Members may also submit names of girls to attend the class.

**Programs:** Alice Gibson reported for Judy Brown who was in Houston meeting with Ricky Tims to invite him to present lecture/class at the 2018 RGVQG Quilt Show. She stated the two days of free motion quilting classes for March are filled. There are 9 or 10 spaces available in the painting class.

**Schoolhouse:** Karen Dill called for Show and Tell from the February 9 and 10 Folded Block class students. She announced the Tote Class for February 17 and the March 3 Easy Bear Paw class which will be taught by Renee Darkis.

**Retreat:** Karyn Heaney asked that all queries regarding the Friendship Star and Bluebonnet Friends Retreats be directed to her **only** and not to Bonnie Hall. Members who need to cancel attendance at the Friendship Star Retreat may receive full refund if they cancel by February 21 and those who cannot attend the Bluebonnet Friends Retreat must cancel by February 28 for full refund. Bring extension cords and duct tape, sewing machines and supplies.

Corners should be white with a green print center and darker green print or solid for the outer points.

Winners who attend a National Show must take classes and give a demonstration of class techniques and project at a Guild meeting.

**2017 Quilt Show:** Karon Jacobson, Quilt Show Chairperson, recognized the Quilt Show Board members and volunteers. She congratulated the ribbon winners, including Mike Hall who was a first-time winner and Kathleen Dombi, Best of Show winner with her "Bed of Roses." Karon expressed her thanks to everyone (including her husband) for a good show.

Karon reported a show income of more than \$33,000 and expenses of \$19,000 plus. After deducting an amount for the 2018 Quilt Show, Karon presented a check for \$14,000 to the Guild. Attendance was 1,625 for the two days of the show. Sales of Opportunity Quilt tickets amounted to \$3,868. Marsha Santow won the opportunity quilt, Terry Davis won the tote, and Donna Wendel won the miniature.

The drawing of ticket sales earned by members included two baskets at a value of \$591 each and 9 books. Ten more books will be awarded at the March meeting. Basket winners were: Rosie Garza and Jean Nickila. Winners of Volunteer awards received fabric donated by show vendors. They were: Lucy Klaas, Terry Davis and Sylvia Moreno.

**2018 Quilt Show:** Alice Gibson, Chairperson, revealed the Opportunity Quilt for the 2018 Quilt Show, "Sewing with the Stars." Lila Helm made the quilt, "Amish With A Twist Two." The show will be held January 26-27, 2018. Alice issued a call for many quilts for the show.

Show Challenge: Choose a star quilter, designer, etc. who influenced you in your quilting journey and include a "paper" story about this experience. Quilt must be 24" x 24." Specifics will be posted on the website.

She said Judy Brown is negotiating with Ricky Tims for a class/lecture at the Quilt Show and another star quilter, Karen Stone, plans to present also.

Opportunity quilt tickets are ready for pickup and Alice encouraged all members to sell or buy their tickets.

# 2017 Program Updates

Judy Steward will be here in March and will be teaching free motion quilting on your home machine (on March 8 and 10) and painting fabric (on March 9.) The samples Judy sent look wonderful:

#### Painting Fabric



In the circle quilt the "background" fabric is some of her painted fabric. This is more of an overall painting to create a piece of fabric you may want for background or to cut up and use as a portion of a quilt

The smaller sample shows that you can paint a scene and quilt it as if it was a picture

#### Machine Quilting

The machine quilting sample shows the stages we will go through starting with the basic shapes.

The top left pink fabric of the sample with her name in it, is an example of the basic shapes used in all designs. The second step is to follow lines. The shapes we use are the hearts, spools and leaf design. The third step is finding filler designs like swirls, circles, loops and countless other ones that students find success in creating. We will also touch on trapunto.



Judy starts the class talking about threads, needles, batting, marking, and tricks to help. This information comes from over 25 years of machine quilting on her domestic sewing machine for herself and other.

There are a few openings for the Wednesday, March 8 class.


