Evelyn Fincher, Scholarship Chairperson, presented Rosario Garcia and Eric Vega with the 2018 scholarships.

Elaine Muzichuk introduced our speaker, Marci Baker. Marci provided a program on Top Secret Tips.

Guild "Kick-Starts" Students' College Goals

Hey, ya'll members of the Rio Grande Valley Quilt Guild, once again we have provided two graduating high school seniors with an opportunity to fulfill their dreams of Fashion Design careers.

Rosario Garcia and Erick Vega each received a 2018 scholarship award letter for \$2,000 at the March 10 Guild meeting.

Garcia, a homeschool senior at the Catholic Institute for the Arts and Academics, Edinburg, and Erick Vega, a senior at Sharyland High School also in Edinburg, were chosen from nine scholarship applicants.

The criteria for scholarship selection is based on printed Guild guidelines and state that the applicant must be a graduating high school senior and plan to attend college and major or minor in "the arts related to textiles, including fashion, designing, pattern making, study of materials, dyes, color, and other textile-related studies". Other considerations are extracurricular activities and grade point average. In the event there are no qualified high school senior applicants for the two scholarships, former scholarship students who plan to continue their studies according to the Guild guidelines may apply for consideration.

Letters were mailed in October 2017 by Evelyn Fincher, High School/College Scholarship Committee Chairman, to Rio Grande Valley high school counselors and art departments. Other members of the committee are Donna Brown, Judy Bassett, and Phyllis Kabay. The committee met following the February 27, 2018 application deadline, ranked applicants and sent their recommendations to the Executive Board members who approved the final selections.

Fincher introduced Garcia and Vega. Garcia plans to attend Texas A&M, Kingsville, and major in Fashion Design with a minor in Business.

She spoke about her sewing and quilting interests and accomplishments and showed pictures of her junior sewing class students and their work. After expressing thanks to the Guild and her family, Garcia stated, "I anticipate that with the experience I have acquired and further education I will be able to reach my dream of designing my own fashion line."

Garcia also introduced Adolfo, her father; Guadalupe, her mother, and her sister and two brothers, who also sew and quilt.

Vega plans to attend the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, Edinburg. He expressed a desire to pursue a career in Fashion Design and Business.

"My ultimate goal is to have my own fashion brand," Vega shared. He also thanked the Guild members for providing him with the scholarship opportunity.

Fincher presented award letters to the students and explained the procedure for receipt of the award checks. A RGVQG representative will present certificates to the scholarship winners at their respective high school awards assemblies in May and June.

Local Quilter Semifinalist in International Quilt Show

Paducah, Kentucky, USA – Kathleen Dombi from Weslaco is a semifinalist for the 2018 AQS QuiltWeek® – Spring Paducah, Kentucky April 18 – 21, 2018, at the Schroeder Expo & Carroll Convention Center in Paducah, Kentucky.

Kathleen has been chosen to display the quilt, BED OF ROSES, along with 404 others in the annual contest, now in its 34th year. Three quilting authorities will judge this elite group in Paducah, awarding first-, second-, and third-place prizes in 16 categories, along with nine overall awards. Winners will be announced at the 34th AQS Awards Presentation, which takes place at the Carson Four Rivers Center in Paducah at 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 17. Cash awards totaling \$125,000 will be granted, including \$20,000 for the Janome Best of Show; \$12,000 for the BERNINA Stationary Machine Workmanship; \$12,000 for the AQS Hand Workmanship; \$12,000 for the APQS Movable Workmanship; and \$5,000 for the Hobbs Best Wall Quilt. Regardless of how BED OF ROSES places in the final judging, all semi-finalists' quilts will be displayed at the show, which is expected to draw more than 30,000 people.

AQS Founder and President Meredith Schroeder says, "Creativity and color are themes that run through the contest quilts this year. Regardless of whether the attendees enjoy traditional bed quilts or innovative art quilts, there will be quilts for everyone to enjoy."

Quilts were entered in this international contest from 45 US states and 13 other countries. Come see a wide range of special exhibit quilts including: SAQA - Korean Quilts Now; Contemporary Art Quilts – U.S. and Brazil; Fresh Faces/New Ideas: PAAQT Challenge; Cherrywood Challenge 2017: Van Gogh French Gallery; Art in Denim by Ian Berry; Ricky Tims: Quilts That Speak; and the AQS Authors' Showcase.

The American Quilter's Society hosts several shows annually, each with its own quilt contest. Besides the Paducah, Kentucky show, AQS hosts other prestigious shows in Daytona Beach, Florida; Lancaster, Pennsylvania; Grand Rapids, Michigan; and Virginia Beach, Virginia.

<u>Step 1:</u> Gather 2-42 %" strips and 2-28 %" strips of the Contrasting fabric. Sew one 28 ½" strip to one end of one 42 ½" strip. Then repeat with the other two strips, creating 2-70 %" strips. Press toward the longer pieces.

Step 2: Gather 2-42 %" strips and 2-28 %" strips of the Feature. Sew one 28 %" strip to one end of one 42 %" strip. Then repeat with the other two strips, creating 2-70 %" strips. Press toward the shorter pieces.

<u>Step 3:</u> Line up the seams and sew one Feature strip to the side of one Contrasting strip, then repeat with the other two strips. Press toward the Feature.

<u>Step 4:</u> Sew the Contrasting side of each Border strip (made in Step 3) to each side of the Quilt Top, and press toward the Contrasting fabric.

Two colorways.

Step 5: Gather 2 – 42 ½" strips and 4 – 14 ½" strips of the Contrasting fabric. Sew one 14 1/2"

strip to each end of one 42 1/2" strip. Then repeat with the remaining Contrasting strips,

creating 2 - 70 ½" strips. Press toward the longer piece.

Step 6: Gather 2 - 42 1/2" strips and 2 - 14 % strips of the Feature. Sew one 14 1/2" strip to each end of one 42 1/2" strip. Then repeat with the remaining Feature strips, creating 2 - 70 1/2"

strips. Press toward the shorter pieces.

Step 7: Line up the seams and sew one Feature strip to the side of one Contrasting strip, then

repeat with the other two strips. Press toward the Feature.

Step 8: Gather 4 – 4 ½" squares of Feature fabric, and 16 - 2 1/2" x 6 ½" rectangles of

Contrasting fabric. Create 4 Roundabouts as in Clue 5. Sew a Roundabout to each end of the

Border strips (made in Step 7), then press toward the Border strip.

Step 9: Sew the Contrasting side of one Border strip to the top side of the Quilt Top, and the


Contrasting side of one Border strip to the bottom side of the Quilt Top, then press toward the

Contrasting fabric. Your quilt top is complete!!!




