Military Service Quilt Tops as well as Baby Quilt Tops were sewn as well.

The beginning of March started a new venture for the Sew N Sew Quilters Bee. After 6 weeks of waiting 10 quilters could begin working again in the quilt room, which had been closed since March 11,2020. Best of Show



Best of Show - Diamonds by Julia Hanley

Art Quilts: These quilts must be an original design by the quilt maker. These may utilize multiple techniques, include embellishments, thread painting, beading, painting on fabric, photography on fabric, etc.



Pisces By Vicki Guerra

Challenge Quilts: 2021: When someone quilts a memory -- This year the challenge will be to take a pre-1960 VINTAGE BLOCK or VINTAGE LINEN and create a new wall hanging for future generations to cherish.



Modern Merges With Vintage By Karen Knowlton

Modern Quilts: These quilts generally have the following characteristics: Simplified, abstract design; Use of solid fabrics, bold colors, large prints; Negative space is very important in the overall composition; Improvisational piecing may be employed; Upcycled/recycled fabrics are often used; Quilting is restrained, often linear.



Diamonds By Julia Hanley

Quilts of Today - Wall Quilts: This category includes ANY entry that is pieced, embroidered, appliquéd, whole cloth, hand and/or machine quilted specifically made to be hung on the wall. Can include wool appliqué.



Military Quilt By Tee Box Quilters

Quilts of Today - Bed Quilts: This category includes ANY entry that is pieced, embroidered, appliquéd, whole cloth, hand and/or machine quilted specifically made to be used as a throw or bed covering. Can include wool appliqué.



Military Quilt Honoring My Husband By Karen Knowlton

Quilts of Tomorrow: This category includes wall or bed quilts made by novice quilters; either youth or adults who have quilted less than 3 years. Any quilting form is acceptable but must have 3 layers and be quilted, not tied.

2021 Quilt Show

The 2021 Show Board experience for us turned out to be quite different from the previous 38 shows. After the pandemic closed much of the country, including the Canadian borders, it was apparent that we were going to be unable to host an in-person show. The SPI Convention Center allowed us to roll-over our \$4950 deposit to 2022 and we began brainstorming alternatives. A virtual quilt show became our goal.

Our web resource in this plan was Jenna Purdy, a friend who was

pursing a career as a web designer. She had completed a 6month boot camp in web design and was willing to work with us for free, to create an addition to her portfolio. My membership in American Quilt Study Group proved to be helpful as they provided quilt history lectures for the show with no charge. The lectures introduced their organization to the general quilting public through our show. Allison Rainboth and Susan Slaton also provided

lectures at no cost to the guild. The software used for the Quilt Gallery was a free open-source software developed for art shows and academia which worked well with the excellent photographs taken by June and Dale Borneman and quilters who were not able to come to the RGV this year. The remaining software was purchased as well as

an additional website that could support the software needed for the show.

The show board was restructured into three teams: Quilt Gallery, Marketplace, and Education. The fact that we were able to complete this huge endeavor successfully is entirely due to the hard work by the members of the Show Board. This committee work required at least one Zoom meeting a week, and for some members two or three Zoom meetings a week.

Our vendors were contacted following the show and all have indicated that they were happy with the show and had an increase in sales with some

of the sales coming from outside the US. They are willing to vend again for us, though the non-Texas shops would want that to be virtually. They also have consented to have their links posted on the Guild website.

Although the final show figures are not completed since several items have not been paid for by bidders, the show broke even. The production of the show cost \$1065.00 The remainder of the expenses include fixed expenses such as the storage units and insurance, as well as the cost of items that were

purchased in preparation for the in-person show. The cost of these items that could not be used: raffle tickets, supplies for the opportunity quilt, quilting of the opportunity quilt and more, has been covered by the show income. This means that there are sufficient funds to support the 2022 show.



My heartfelt thanks to all the show board members, who worked tirelessly on a quilt show created in a new format using Zoom, technologies unfamiliar to most of us prior to the pandemic. You all were supportive of me when I reached the point of too much Zoom, ebbing sanity, and not enough time! You Rock!!!

The other amazing group that deserves praise are those individuals who donated items for the silent auction and those who entered your quilts and paraphernalia in the quilt gallery. There was a lot of eye candy for the quilt show viewers!

Military Service

Lucy and Mellie met March 4 for a short planning session. Sew N Sew has had two additional Military Sew Days, February 26 and March 3, and produced 16 additional tops brought to the Alamo Country Club bundling day held on March 5, 2021. 7 more were added to the tops during the storage shed on Friday, March 12. 14 quilts were bundled at Alamo Country Club and the fabric, scraps and remnants were sorted and organized by the 5/6 quilters present. Three Military Service Quilts were presented by Karon Jacobson in February at Sandpiper Resort, Edinburg, and we are awaiting photographs and the Community Service documentation for them. Three more MSQ's are being presented on March 21 at Sandpiper Resort.

The Military Service Quilt Committee request:

- Donations of red, white and blue fabric (yardage preferred, but large remnants or large scraps will work.)
- 2. Monetary Donations designated to RGVQG Military Service Quilt Committee.
- 3. Batting--80/20 preferred. (bolts, yardage or very large remnants) and backing fabric (yardage or can be sewn...)

Also, it is requested that the RGVQG consider the possibility of presenting a quilt to a qualified non-permanent resident of the valley for a donation to RGVQG/Military Service. is under consideration

Quilters and binders are an on-going need. Completed tops are always welcome.

An inventory of available quilts, tops, wheel chair quilts, quilt bundles for MSQ's, ready to be quilted, batting and backing availability has been completed by Kathy Dunning (acting for Lucy Klass) and Mellie Peach. This includes what is currently in stock at Alamo Country Club and at the Guild storage facility. There are 3 quilts at Mike and Bonnie Hall's and other officer's and Board member's homes that will be presented to our veterans.

Minutes March 13, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 9:30 am by the President, Kathe Letulle. Seventy-four participants were on line and a quorum was established.

Mike Hall, Treasurer, presented the Treasurer's report. There were no comments or corrections, so it was filed for audit.

Secretary's report of minutes taken at the last general meeting by Diana Wolf were printed in the newsletter for member review. There were no additions or corrections, so they stood approved.

We have a new Programs Chair, Jean Waufle, Kathe Letulle announced. Laural Powell was our Programs Chair. However, she is the incoming Quilt Show Chair which can demand much time so she transitioned positions. Jean also plans to run for Programs Chair this next season.

Laural Powell stated the Show Committee was still assessing how the Show went. It is hoped a live show at the South Padre Island Convention Center could be held as they currently hold our deposit for it. The exact dates will depend upon whether it is inperson or online. An in-person would be held February 18th and 19th, 2022, and an online show would be held in February, sometime that would not conflict with another show. The Show committee is cautiously optimistic, but proceeding carefully in their analysis. Activity on The Opportunity Quilt has been suspended for the near term, pending a decision about how the show will be held next year.

She did have a request that Bees design and make a quilted banner about their Bee. It should be sized 21 inches by 42 inches, orientated either vertically or horizontally, and which includes a sleeve for hanging. The banners can then be used year after year, in various ways. The theme for the Quilt Show this year will be The Wizard of Oz. The theme for the Challenge category is "There is no place like home". The banners could be used in a scavenger hunt for an in-person show.

If you don't currently belong to a Bee, there is a list on the Guild website and you can join an open Bee. Jean Waufle, our new Programs chair announced the April meeting would be about Quilting Bees.

The winners of the Academic Scholarships will also be announced at the April meeting.

Laurie Magee, the recent Show Chair, shared the almost final financial report from the Virtual Quilt Show. She thanked all the Quilt Show volunteers who worked incredibly hard over the last few months. The figures are almost final, but there are a few outstanding but small financial issues. In a simplified format, the Show total income was \$4,495.03 with total expenditures of \$4,587.00. This covered several fixed expenses such as storage rental, tickets printed previously for an in-person show, fabric for the Opportunity Quilt and other items. Website hosting was purchased for two years, which means we own the hosting service for the webpage for another year. The webpage could perhaps be used for on-line sales or other projects.

The totals do not reflect the value of many, many hours of many volunteer time by members and persons not members but who were responsible for most of the web design and implementation. Some classes were donated, others cost \$600 but had income of \$720.00, which was very good. She feels inexperience was met by determination, and overall, the show was a success. She received many favorable remarks about a Guild of our size pulling off a virtual show like this without professional help for design and support. Deb Blackbourn surveyed the vendors after the show and they were generally pleased with the results for their shops. This is critical information for next year's show; no matter if it is in-person or virtual. Some sales occurred from outside the United States. Many favorable comments about the Show were received from Guild members.

A slide show of the winning quilts in the virtual show are on the Show and RGVQG website. They will also appear in the newsletter.



Gayle Steinbeck as Hostess announced the door prize winners. They were Bev Widdows, Sandy Bagot, Jane Ross, Kay Moreland and Marge Lehman.

Mellie Peach announced the Weslaco Museum has a display through April of antique quilts. She encouraged members to view it. The Harlingen Arts and Heritage museum is showing the winners from the Paducah Show "New Quilts from an Old Favorite - Wheel of Fortune" until April 16th.

One of the counselors at the school where a recipient of the Academic Scholarship is a student wants a video clip of the award ceremony next month. Various ways to do this were discussed.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:01 am by Kathe Letulle, President.

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
