Kathe Letulle, President, called the meeting to order at 9:00 am. Because our meeting happened to fall on the 10-year anniversary of the 9-11 attacks, a moment of silence and individual prayer was observed.

The Treasurer's report was approved and will be filed for audit.

The Secretary's report was approved.

Kathe presented an update on the Quilt show. Progress continues to be made. There are still a few positions available for volunteers for the Show. Bonnie Hall stated she has the registrations open for quilt entries and classes by the Show speaker. You can register for one or both classes at the same time. Roster information for both Show and Schoolhouse classes is also available on the RGVQG Members Only page.

Kathe noted we need Chairs for 2023 and 2024. It one or both of these positions are not filled, it will significantly impact the Guild in a negative way. She asked for persons willing to do this to come forward. The Guild has a significant amount of fixed expenses which must be covered. She is very concerned our bank balance could go to zero by December of next year without Quilt Show revenues.

Mike Hall noted that Go With Jo tour company is willing to provide a bus to and from the upper valley to our Show on Friday. The route would include pickup and return to Mission and Weslaco. He needs to hear who is interested. It was suggested this be advertised outside of the Guild to parks which have quilting groups but are not in the Guild.

Jean Waufle presented the program. The attendees were presented a list of questions and asked the members to pick one they would like to discuss. The group was split into Zoom rooms and asked to select a spokesperson for their group and report back on their question. The members came back with many good tips and suggestions, seemed to enjoy the opportunity to visit with others in their group.

Planning for Friendship Day has begun. Presently there is no chair, but one would be welcome. We are planning a potluck, some demonstrations and some games. It may include a Chinese auction where gently used items are wrapped, people are assigned numbers and the items can be stolen.

After the program, the discussion turned to why we no longer have a Block of the Month presented

during the General Meetings. The chairs of the committee are no longer members of the Guild and no one else has stepped forward. If a committee chair would volunteer, this could return. Chris Cowan volunteered to become the chair of Block of the Month.

Kathe asked that Jan Rondeau be sent articles to include in her Publicity activities which she can include in the newsletter or in announcements to Valley print media.

It was announced that articles are due Monday to the Newsletter Editor, Judy Brown.

Door prize winners were announced by Gayle Steinbeck who explained how the winners were chosen. The winners are: Kris Driscoll, Chris Cowan, Beth Braun, Kathy Snyder, and Linda Damon.

Show and Tell followed with pictures of quilts, table runners, placemats, mug mats and bags done by members. Mary Camp complimented our members for their good work and willingness to share with others. Mary Britton showed bookmarks for the corner of a page. They were well received and she was asked to share the directions. She plans to make more for the Boutique. Sandy Shelter has made folded star hot pads and will be teaching a 3-hour class on them at Tropic Winds RV Park. Some of these could be in the Boutique too. Beach fabric items often sell well.

Several members commented about making guests and new members feel welcome at our meetings. It is too easy to sit with our friends we know and not reach out to let newcomers know we are a friendly group. If a new member volunteers to become involved with a project or committee, it becomes a quick way to know other members. Zoom has helped several people put names and faces together, and several credited it with keeping the organization alive. We are all looking forward to in person meetings.

Marty Morrison noted we are looking for candidates for officers. The Nominating committee is trying to find persons willing to step into positions.

A storyline consists of the narrative threads connecting characters and events, often with surprise twists that can complicate the main narrative as it weaves the events that hold our attention until the end.

Jane Burch Cochran catches our attention with her ornamental embellishment of beads, buttons, and paint, enhancing her narratives with an abundance of texture that keeps our eyes moving around the surface.

Wendy Huhn's signature techniques of image transfer and screen-printing vividly enable her to present her tales, juxtaposing imaginary characters with mundane objects to pique our curiosity.

Joan Schulze, who is also a poet, gathers her photographs, fragments of text, and other materials into surfaces that make her stories sing, with themes of loss, personal connections, and individuality.

Dr. Sandra Sider, Museum curator, comments, "this exhibition brings you three of my favorite quilt artists, whose works have amused and intrigued audiences for many years. Come see what they have to say!"

Hidden Treasures: Antique Quilts from the Collection of Carolyn Miller will feature more than 25 quilts showing some of the best of Miller's pieces, which she began acquiring in the early 1990's after her own quilting journey began.

Museum Collections Manager Vicki
Mangum is the guest curator. And Miller
herself will give a special free gallery
tour/talk on Saturday, October 3, at 3
pm (with Museum admission free
beginning at 2 pm).


While Miller has done her own quilting by machine, she was very intrigued by the pictures of quilts in magazines with gorgeous hand quilting.

In one of those magazines, she saw a small ad for a meeting in Paducah, KY, and immediately signed up for it. It was her first seminar with the American Quilt Study Group and the first session she attended was with Merikay Waldvogel speaking about collectors of early quilt patterns.

Miller has also collected a large library of quilt history books that continue to teach her about the antique fabrics and styles of the different quilts she has amassed. Guest curator Vicki Mangum, says "the depth and breadth of Miller's collection is awe inspiring!"

Finally, the work of one of the world's best-known quilters of smaller works is celebrated with the 30 pieces in *Miniature Art, Grand Designs, by Kumiko Frydl*.

Japanese designer Kumiko Frydl settled in Houston after residing in Canada and Great Britain. With a background in commercial art and dressmaking, she began quilting in 1987 after she moved to Canada. Her first projects were quilted garments, and then she moved on to medium-sized quilts.

But because her husband's job required her to relocate frequently, Frydl began to concentrate mainly on miniature quilts, which are easy to transport.

She quilts by hand and machine, and has become an expert in ribbon embroidery. Her amazing miniature pieces have won numerous prizes at the major quilt festivals, and Frydl has been honored with solo exhibitions in France, Japan, Russia, and Spain. Dr. Sandra Sider, Museum curator, says "we are thrilled to share the incredible talent of Kumiko Frydl with our visitors!"
