

Those that attended the January Schoolhouse class led by Pat Cooper, learned a wonderful hand quilting technique that is used by the Siddi's in India. We each planned and made a small Kawandi ...or blanket ...and had a lot of fun using a wide variety of scraps.

The February 4th class is a "Four Path Explosion" technique, led by Marty Morrison. You will bring several four patch blocks, and through a series of cutting and inserting contrasting strips....you end up with a wonderful new block. A supply list is provided under the Schoolhouse option in the drop down list

The March 4th class is "Fun with Circles", led by Debi Warner. This class will stretch your creativity and provide you an opportunity to play with all kinds of embellishments. A supply list is provided under the Schoolhouse option in the drop down list.

Two wonderful quilts were made from the 33 Disappearing Four Patch submitted in December by the winners, Rene Pageau and me.

20-6" and 42-12" beautiful "Lost Goslin'" blocks were turned in at the January meeting. Nancy Plantz won the 6" blocks and Bonnie Hall won the 12" ones. Looks like Military Service Quilts might have a quilt coming their way in the spring!

February's block is has 2 names, Four Corners or The Continental. Four Corners is what Bonnie Hunter called it in her Addicted to Scraps column in the Nov/Dec 2021 Quiltmaker magazine.

The Continental is block #1949 in The Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns compiled by Barbara Brackman. It was designed by Twyla Dell to commemorate the 1st Continental Quilting Congress in 1978. It was published in Quilter's Newletter Magazine #104.

Think Spring as you pick your three fabrics, a main color fabric in spring flower colors, a medium/light green and white or white on white. Look at the accompanying list of components and diagram as you make *your 9" finished size block*. Make the flying geese and HSTs with your favorite method.

I have also posted the information on our Facebook page. You should also be able to go to Bonnie Hunter's website and look for her tab labeled "Addicted to Scraps" to see this block and all previous ones.


4 white 2 ½"x 2 ½" squares

This month, I got three questions about the 2022 Quilt Show.

Barb asked How does signing up for a class at the Quilt Show help the Guild?

Answer: The Quilt Show contracts with our Presenters almost a year in advance, so we are locked into that expense. So, the more people we have sign up for the classes, the more we off set that expense. If we don't bring in enough in class registration fees, the remaining expense must be taken out of the Quilt Show profits. Therefore, the more people we have sign up for classes, the more profit we have to turn over to the Guild!

Lucy asked will there be a Community Service Room at the Quilt Show?

Answer: Yes, we will have a Community Service Room at the 2022 Quilt Show. Green Bees from Mission have stepped up to man the Community Service Room. They did an amazing job at the 2020 Show.

Ann asked: Will we get our Challenge Quilts back after the show, or are they auctioned off?

Answer: This year all quilts (including the Challenge Quilts) registered for the Quilt Show will be returned to the owners.

QUILT APPRAISALS AT THE 2022 RGVQG QUILT SHOW
We will have an AQS certified appraiser, Allison Rainboth,
available to us during the two days of our show. This is a
great advantage to those of us who live in South Texas as the
nearest appraisers are in San Antonio, Austin, and North Texas. Please make an appointment on the RGVQG web page.
Allison will provide a written appraisal for vintage quilts for
\$50 or if she feels the end value is modest, she will provide the
owned with a verbal appraisal for \$25. She will provide only
written appraisals for contemporary quilts for \$50. In addition
to the written document, Allison works with the owner to provide a wide variety of information about the quilt. In other
words, working with her, you learn a lot!

Every quilt has a value. It might be sentimental value, financial value, historical value, or decorative value. A quilt appraiser's job is to find that value. A quilt appraisal is a written document that determines an objective value for your piece, whether newly finished or a family heirloom. The appraisal includes written documentation substantiating that value and requires an unbiased opinion from an educated and certified professional.

There are three basic kinds of appraisals: Insurance Replacement Value, Fair Market Value, and Donation Value.

Insurance Replacement Value (a value to replace your piece with one of "like and kind," or what it would take to replace your quilt if the need arose).

If you're planning to enter a major show, you'll need an appraisal of this kind to go along with your entry to the show. .

If your quilt is damaged or destroyed, you can go to your insurance agent and ask for reimbursement, but most insurance agents will reimburse you for the cost of a Walmart blanket, not the value of a work of art. Remember that houses burn or flood, pipes burst, things get stolen, and hur-

ricanes and tornadoes happen!

Fair Market Value (These are for guilts you plan to sell).

This kind of appraisal describes a value

that would be mutually agreed upon between a willing and knowledgeable buyer and willing and knowledgeable seller when the item is exposed to the open market for a reasonable period of time. It isn't a guarantee of a sales price but is an educated determination by an appraiser who has

knowledge of the current market.

Donation Value

Appraisals are required to satisfy the IRS requirements for donations. You'd need

this if you were donating a quilt or wanted to establish a value for estate planning. This is particularly important if some of your quilts have won prizes.

Appraiser Biography

Allison Rainboth, owner of Sisters Choice Quilting Service in Berlin, WI, has been longarm quilting for others since 2003, and has completed more than 3,000 pieces to date. She has a strong interest in antique and vintage quilts and is a member of the American Quilt Study Group and the Wisconsin Quilt Study Group. Allison is a Certified Quilt Judge and is also an AQS Certified Appraiser of Quilts and Quilted Textiles. Allison lives in Berlin in a 100+ year old house with two Scotties, three cats, and her husband Walter, who recently retired after many years as a professor of Biology at University of Wisconsin Oshkosh. She was born in the Los Angeles area and learned to drive in the Rose Bowl parking lot. In her spare time, she loves to cook and read fantasy and mystery novels.

RGV General Meeting Minutes

General Guild meeting, 8 January 8, 2022

The meeting was called to order by Kathe Letulle at 9:02 am. A quorum was present.

Kristi Gomez had volunteered to run for Secretary. Kathe called for nominations from the floor, and heard none. Kristi was Secretary elected by a show of hands.

The new officers were installed, Marsha Santow as President, Jan Rondeau as 3rd VP and Programs and Kristi Gomez as Secretary. They took the Oath of Office, then signed them and gave them to the Secretary to be placed on file for four years.

Marsha Santow presented a thank you to Kathe for her work as President, Diana Wolf, Secretary, and Jean Waufle as Program Chair.

Jan Rondeau introduced Carla Klop as the Program Speaker. Her technique for cutting and piece assembly was a very pleasant and informative presentation. She was a self-taught quilter and began to design using methods she discovered. She offered the Guild the wholesale pricing for her binder (with free shipping) if a minimum number were ordered. There was great interest, and Bonnie Hall is to put up a form to enable this.

Debi Warner and a few friends performed a skit to help everyone remember the theme for this year's guilt show is The Wizard of Oz. Laural Powell, Show Chair, noted there is less than six weeks away from the opening of the Show. So far, the committee has received income about equal to the expenses to date. If the Show brings in about half the income from admissions, Totes and More, Opportunity Quilt, Silent Auction, and the boutique, then the Quilt Show will break even. If income generated goes above that, there will be a possibility to give the Guild a check for their expenses. This would help cover the Guild's annual fixed expenses of approximately \$3,900. A membership of 200 at \$30 per member generates income of \$6000. This is close to \$2000 over the fixed expenses and funds other expense such as programs, classes, scholarships and the rest. The Show Committee recently talked with SPI Convention Center and found ways to save approximately an additional \$1000 for the show expenses.

She explained this is a transitional year, between a virtual show, and an in-person show facing lots of challenges with COVID issues, a shortage of volunteers and other issues. It will take a while to get back to the type of in person show we are used to producing. She feels breaking even this year would be considered a success. She explained the many ways members can help with the Quilt Show and make a difference to the Guild. She also explained the relationship between the Quilt Show Committee and the Guild.

She requested if you have unsold Opportunity Quilt tickets, please bring them to the next Guild meeting so the can be redistributed.

Bonnie Hall registered many quilts for the Show at the meeting. Bonnie wanted to know if all quilts brought to the meeting that day were registered, or she would make help you complete the registration.

Mike Hall stated the Treasurer's report would be in the newsletter. Marsha Santow also announced the minutes from the meeting today would also appear in the next newsletter. The deadline for the newsletter remains the same, and can be sent to news-letter@rgvqg.com.

Marty Morrison stated as of the meeting, the Guild had 193 members

There are still a few openings in the Friendship Star retreat. Retreat t-shirts can be ordered.

The Schoolhouse class was reported to be most enjoyable by the participants in the slow stitching project. There are two more in person classes scheduled. Members can sign up through the Guild web page.

There are two Military Sew Days coming, one on Jan 19th at Snow to Sun, and another Feb 11th at Trophy Gardens. Both will have lunch provided. She announced a \$100 cash donation from Alamo Country Club to the committee.

February Guild meeting will occur but there will not be a speaker. The Quilt Show will be the following week.

Bonnie Hall shared that several members are making quilts and pillowcases for a group which supports foster children aging out of the system. She would welcome more participants to help the group.


